PACE in California



- The Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) benefits the State of California, its seniors, and their families by offering a proven, cost-effective, and high-quality alternative to nursing home placement for frail seniors who wish to live in the community.
- PACE organizations currently serve nearly 7,000 participants at 39 PACE Centers and Alternative Care Sites in 12 counties, including Alameda, Contra Costa, Fresno, Humboldt, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, and Santa Clara.
- PACE is unique among care programs serving older adults in that it provides all services needed by frail seniors to enable them to live safely in the community, including all acute care and long-term supports and services.
- PACE serves a very diverse population. The average participant in California is 76 years old, but many are in their 80s and 90s. A high percentage have Alzheimer's or related dementia. More than 2/3 or participants speak a language other than English as their primary language.
- Despite serving a very frail nursing home-eligible senior population, only three percent of participants are living in nursing homes at any given time. More than 90 percent say they are very satisfied with PACE.

PACE also provides tremendous fiscal benefits to the State of California in savings of up to \$19 million per year. PACE costs up to 34 percent less than institutional care for the same types of beneficiaries.

- Former CMS Administrator Andy Slavitt has referred to PACE as a "glimpse into the future." The federal PACE Innovation Act gives CMS authority to test adaptations of the PACE model of care with new populations including younger adults with disabilities and older adults at risk of nursing home placement.
- PACE was first developed in the 1980s in California (by On Lok in San Francisco) and has grown nationally to include 123 programs in 31 states.
